BOIL YOUR WATER BEFORE USING

CUSTOMERS OF THE GREATER PLATTSBURGH AREA WATER DISTRICT IN THE TOWN OF PLATTSBURGH LIVING ON: **Quarry Road – Marty’s Carpet and 3 homes (Numbers 137, 157, 159, 163)**, ARE HEREBY ORDERED BY THE CLINTON COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT TO BOIL ALL WATER FOR DRINKING AND CULINARY PURPOSES.

Our office was notified on 9/5/2010 that the water distribution system lost pressure due to a line shut down in order to make repairs to a water line. When the distribution pipes and mains lose pressure it increases the chance that untreated water and harmful microbes could enter the system.

DO NOT DRINK THE WATER WITHOUT BOILING IT FIRST. Bring all water to a boil, let it boil for one minute, and let it cool before using, or use bottled water certified for sale by the New York State Department of Health. Boiled or bottled water should be used for drinking, making ice, brushing teeth, washing dishes, and food preparation **until further notice**. Boiling kills most bacteria and other organisms in the water.

Harmful microbes in drinking water can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms. They may pose a special health risk for infants, some elderly, and people with severely compromised immune systems. The symptoms above are not just caused by organisms in drinking water. If you experience any of these symptoms and they persist, you may want to seek medical advice.

What is being done?

Repairs are being made. You will be informed when tests confirm that no harmful bacteria are in the system and you no longer need to boil your water. It is anticipated that the problem will be resolved within a few days.
